ABOUT CCF

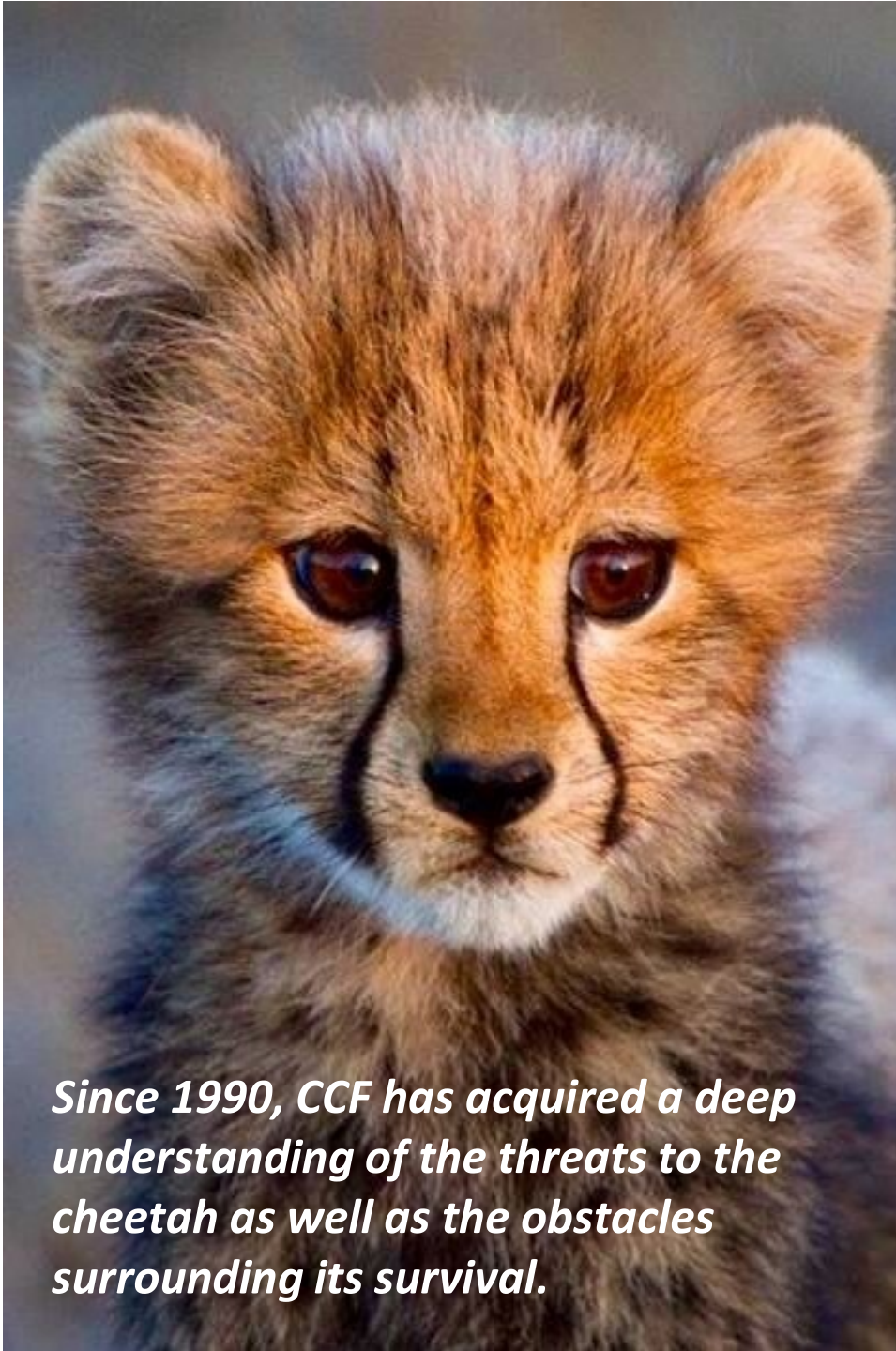
Cheetah Conservation Fund (CCF) is a global non-profit organisation and a leader in the research and conservation of the cheetah. CCF was founded in 1990 by Dr Laurie Marker, a leading conservation biologist and a pioneer of cheetah research.

Having worked with cheetahs since 1974, Dr Marker saw the need to establish a permanent research, education and conservation centre in Namibia to conserve the cheetah in the wild.

CCF takes a long-term and systemic approach to its work. It recognises the importance and value of creating solutions where cheetahs and humans can thrive together.

The cheetah is the most endangered big cat in Africa. Although currently classified as *Vulnerable* by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), with submissions to upgrade to “*Endangered*”, cheetahs are rapidly heading towards extinction.

Cheetahs have already disappeared from more than 20 countries around the world. These unique animals deserve our protection. The race is on to save the cheetah and with your help, it can be won.



Since 1990, CCF has acquired a deep understanding of the threats to the cheetah as well as the obstacles surrounding its survival.

CCF: OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

Among its many achievements, CCF has changed the cultural attitude of an entire nation towards its wildlife; a country that formerly exterminated cheetahs, Namibia has become the “*Cheetah Capital of the World*” and the leader in wildlife conservation among African nations. CCF has also:

- ✓ Conducted and published baseline information on the cheetah and its ecosystem.
- ✓ Delivered direct training to more than 8,000 Namibian farmers.
- ✓ Reached over 500,000 Namibian students through outreach activity.
- ✓ Stabilised the wild cheetah population in Namibia.
- ✓ Generated more than \$7.5 million annual impact on Namibia’s economy
- ✓ Helped build successful conservation programmes elsewhere in the world.
- ✓ Trained more than 500 African biologists, in 15 cheetah-range countries.

WHY SAVE THE CHEETAH

The need for action

There are only 7,100 cheetahs remaining in the world, distributed over 33 populations in 20 countries in Africa and the Middle East.

More than 50% of cheetahs are found in just 6 countries in southern Africa (Angola, Botswana, Mozambique, Namibia, South Africa and Zambia). There is only one other population comprising more than 1,000 cheetahs, while the remaining populations are comprised of 200 cheetahs or less.

What happens if the cheetah disappears?

The Cheetah is an apex predator and without it, there would be serious repercussions that would affect all species in their ecosystem, including humans. Species hunted by the cheetah would not be as healthy; reducing ecosystem biodiversity and weaker animals normally targeted by the cheetah would proliferate and reproduce, thus diluting their species' healthy gene pool. Prey species numbers would grow, increasing environmental impact, soil erosion and climate change.

Over the last century, we've lost more than 92% of the world's wild cheetah population.

HELP SAVE A SPECIES



Funding of £200,000

is needed each year to deliver the Future Farmers of Africa Programme, which provides vital support to the poorest and most marginalised farming community. The programme teaches farmers how to create sustainable livelihoods by implementing non-lethal methods of predator control.

Funding of £100,000

is required each year to deliver CCF's Education Programme, which aims to equip the next generation of farmers and conservation managers with the best training, skill and knowledge available to help protect the cheetah and their ecosystems for years to come.

Funding of £50,000

would enable CCF to increase its capacity to tackle the causes and impacts of the Illegal Wildlife Trade, which continues to pose a huge threat to the cheetah. With your support, CCF can increase global awareness, continue to track and report cases of trafficking and strengthen law enforcement

Funding of £30,000.
