ABOUT CCF


Cheetah Conservation Fund (CCF) is a global non-profit organisation and a leader in the research and conservation of the cheetah. CCF was founded in 1990 by Dr Laurie Marker, a leading conservation biologist and a pioneer of cheetah research.

Having worked with cheetahs since 1974, Dr Marker saw the need to establish a permanent research, education and conservation centre in Namibia to conserve the cheetah in the wild. CCF takes an holistic and long-term approach to its work, recognising the importance and value of creating solutions where cheetahs and humans can thrive together.

The cheetah is the most endangered big cat in Africa with less than 7,500 remaining in the wild. Although currently classified as *Vulnerable* by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), with submissions to upgrade to "*Endangered*", cheetahs are rapidly heading towards extinction.

The mission of CCF UK is to increase awareness about the cheetah and the threats it faces in the wild and all funds raised go directly to support the work of CCF in Namibia and elsewhere in the world.

Cheetahs have already disappeared from more than 20 countries around the world. These unique animals deserve our protection. The race is on to save the cheetah and with your help, it can be won.



OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

Among its many achievements, CCF has changed the cultural attitude of an entire nation towards its wildlife; a country that formerly exterminated cheetahs, Namibia has become the "Cheetah Capital of the World" and the leader in wildlife conservation among African nations.

CCF has also:

- Conducted research studies on the cheetah and its ecosystem and published results
- ✓ Trained more than 10,000 Namibian farmers to reduce human-wildlife conflict and support sustainable livelihoods.
- Established CCF Somaliland to support the reduction in the illegal wildlife trade and to care for cheetahs confiscated from poachers
- ✓ Delivered conservation education to over 650,000 Namibian students, educators and teachers.
- Helped build successful cheetah conservation organisations elsewhere in Africa using CCF's innovative conservation programmes
- ✓ Trained more than 500 African biologists, in 15 cheetah-range countries in Africa
- ✓ Generated more than \$7.5 million annual impact on Namibia's economy

OUR PRIORITIES

Reducing Human-Wildlife Conflict



CCF must raise £750,000

a year to tackle one of the biggest threats to the cheetah human-wildlife conflict. Through programmes such as Future Farmers of Africa, Livestock Guarding Dog and the Mobile Veterinary Clinic, CCF provides farmers and whole communities with the skills, training and tools they need to implement non-lethal methods of predator control, as a way to reduce conflict, to build more sustainable livelihoods and to work towards the reintroduction of wildlife - including cheetahs. .

Fighting the Illegal Wildlife Trade



CCF must raise £150,000

a year to continue providing urgent support and care to cheetahs confiscated from the illegal wildlife trade, from its two temporary safe houses in Somaliland. Additional funds will also enable CCF to continue working with the Somaliland Government to establish a permanent facility and to develop the necessary measures to fight the illegal wildlife trade on an ongoing basis.



CCF must raise £500,000

each year to sustain its scientific and field research activities - the backbone of CCF's education and conservation programmes. CCF's research programme focuses on a number of aspects of the cheetah's life cycle, biology and genetics. Research projects also include ecology, human-wildlife conflict, agriculture, and biomass energy. Through science and research, we aim to discover solutions to secure a future for the cheetah.

Programme	Item	Cost
Illegal Wildlife Trade	Provide vital care, food and veterinary supplies for a whole month for 8 cheetah cubs, confiscated from the illegal wildlife trade.	£2,500
Future Farmers of Africa	Provide essential livestock management training to 30 members of the farming community in Namibia to reduce human-wildlife conflict and safeguard the cheetah in the wild.	£1,500
Mobile Veterinary Clinic	Ensure 20 members of the farming community receive veterinary care for their livestock and help create sustainable livelihoods.	£1,000
